Aloysia Fouché has had a lifelong commitment to serving and supporting her community. First, as an educator, teacher and principal in public schools, and next as a business partner to her husband, Aramis Fouché, who owned Fouché's Hudson Funeral Home in Oakland. She has

operated the funeral home on her own since his death in 2001. In 2015, under her ownership, the funeral home achieved 100 years in business and earned the distinction as the oldest African-American owned funeral business in the Western Region of the United States. Mrs. Fouché ensured that Aramis and the Fouché's Hudson Funeral Home were recognized for this incredible achievement. However, when she herself was inducted into Alameda County's 2016 Women's Hall of Fame, it was time for her to think about accomplishing her own dream: to start a foundation and to continue to give back to the community while leaving a personal legacy for future generations.

When Aloysia Fouché created the Fouché Foundation Fund, a donor-advised fund managed by Richmond Community Foundation, she was driven by the realization that job diversity is the foundation of an effective and efficient community. She feels strongly that a vocation of your choosing can be achieved if you have a vision, determination and the opportunity. We live in a complex, interactive society and must recognize the importance and value of all careers and professions within communities. A variety of vocations is necessary to meet the demands and enhance the day-to-day lives of its people.

Contra Costa County Expands CARES funding to increase residents' access to health care



Ensuring Opportunity worked closely with #OneContraCosta, a broad coalition of health providers, residents and community stakeholders, to secure renewed county funding for the Contra Costa CARES program. Following powerful testimony by

residents and other supporters at a recent county budget hearing, the Board of Supervisors agreed to expand funding for CARES through an innovative public/private partnership between the county and local nonprofit hospitals.

CARES provided primary and preventive health care to nearly 3,000 adults this year who would not otherwise qualify for coverage under Medi-Cal or the Affordable Care Act. CARES enrollees receive high-quality health care services through a

network of local community clinics. Most enrollees are working-age adults with families.

In addition to providing life-saving care to residents, CARES is also saving the county and local hospitals money. Preliminary data suggest that, following the launch of the CARES program two years ago, avoidable emergency room visits have decreased, and diabetes costs are being better controlled.

Housing Renovation Program Hits New Milestones



The processes developed in the first year of the program to acquire legal title to Richmond's boarded up, abandoned homes are bearing fruit as the Richmond Housing Renovation Program acquired its 15th property and freed up two additional properties through the probate process that were acquired by others for a total of 17 impacted properties.

As we track the successes and challenges of our various acquisitions strategies, we have learned several things. While every property has unique legal challenges to obtaining title, and the profit margin on bringing these properties back to market is very small, the systems we have created, especially for the probate process, still make acquiring and rehabbing these properties a viable proposition.

That being said, it has not been possible to acquire properties in close proximity to each other nor to achieve efficiencies in rehab costs of the properties through a "cluster" effect. The legal untangling needed for each property makes clustering almost impossible - the timing simply does not line up. To maximize positive impacts on the neighborhood, however, we are still pursuing properties in close proximity to others we have already acquired.

The impacts of the program are significant:

- For the first two completed properties, the project achieved 100% local hiring with 100% of the companies being minority and/or women owned. Local spend in wages on these first two homes was \$150,670.00.
- Completed homes to date have been sold to local first time home buyers.
- Property Taxes Repaid - \$270,812
- Code Enforcement Fees Paid - \$66,887
- Reduced Code Enforcement Costs - \$119,000

As we complete the properties in our current portfolio we anticipate being able to report on additional neighborhood and financial metrics.

Look for the completion of our next two homes soon, with many more being

completed over the summer.

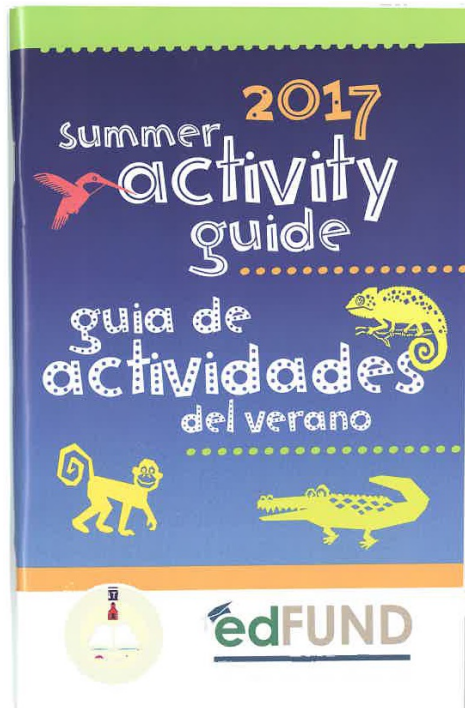

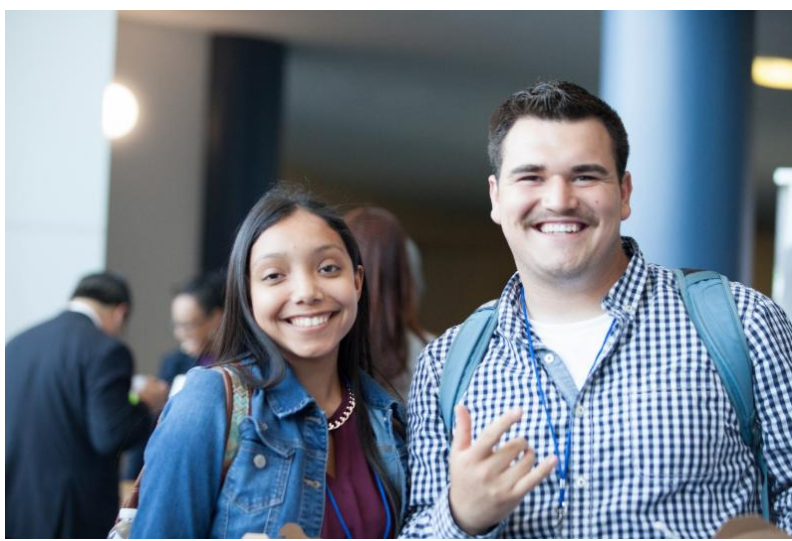
